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## FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

We come once again to the observance of that beautiful Jewish Holiday known by the name of Sukkot.

Our school children will soon be engrossed in the decorating of the Sukkah booth. It will not be long before adults and youngsters will be making the "rounds of the Synagogue" holding Torahs and flags on the festive day of Simchat Torah.

Sukkot commemorates the march of our ancestors through the Wilderness of Sinai and the fact that G-d protected them in that harsh environment by providing booths in which the Children of Israel lived.

In later times the Festival became associated with certain agricultural aspects of the Promised Land, and the term "Season of Our Joy" was added to the description of the day.

The passage of time has not diminished the luster of this Holiday. The symbolism of the Festival is as meaningful to us today as it was to our forefathers. The mystics explain that the Sukkah is a symbol of human life - temporary and frail. And yet, just as we decorate the booth, so do we endeavor to beautify our own lives with noble deeds and upright actions.

As we all know, the sukkah's roof is covered with greens. The law provides that this covering be arranged in such a manner as to have more shade than sunshine within the booth itself. In this law too, there is a great lesson. Life is very often filled with problems, difficulties and hardships of all kinds. So many people have more shade in their lives than sunshine. And yet we must always maintain our faith in G-d, our trust, our confidences, and our high hopes. We must be able to look up and see the stars of a brighter future, in the same way as we look through the roof of the Sukkah and see the stars shining down upon us.

Closely connected with the ritual observance of the Sukkot Festival is the use of the Lulav and the Etrog. The former is a palm branch and reminds us of the body of man, tall, straight, upright, ready to do the will of his Creator in heaven. The latter, the Etrog, is a citron that in size is about the same as the human heart. The Etrog has a very fine fragrance. Would it not be wonderful if human hearts would also have that warm quality about them, which would unite each man with his neighbor and his fellow?

The Children of Israel marched through the wilderness for forty years but finally reached the land of hope and promise. Our generation, our world, is groping also in a wilderness of doubt, dismay, frustration and shattered visions of peace.

We pray however that with our loyalty to the teachings of G-d, and the commands of righteousness and justice, that we too will reach the day of fulfillment for all humanity! Amen!

On behalf of my wife Susan and myself, we wish you all a "Chag Sameach," a beautiful and joyful Holiday.

Sukkot celebrates an earth which is fulfilled. In this season, as we remind ourselves of the fragility of this makeshift structure which we call a Sukkah, each of us must be counted for her/his individual gifts, each of us must reach out to help, to service others, and to do our share of Tikum Olam. This is the rent we must pay for living in this world, which is so blessed by G-d.

It was our first meeting and we welcomed all and greeted each other - especially new member Ruth Schnall. We listened to a precise Israel report from Elaine Abend. Ruth Kaplan, from her recent visit, gave us her views about Israel. Ruthe Unger asked for help to decorate the RPJC sukkah on Thursday, Sept. 27th. Ruthe invited us and the community to attend Sisterhood’s Sukkah Learn-In with Rabbi Waidenbaum on Shabbat afternoon, October 6th at 3:30 P.M. It was our pleasure to announce that we have appointed Elaine Spodick to Sisterhood’s Board and she immediately went to work. Thank you. We then received an appropriate Yom Tov message from Rabbi Waidenbaum explaining spiritual aspects of the season. The highlight of the evening was the so very erudite and meaningful report from our “First Lady” Noreen Daniel, about the special customs and practices of the Indian Bnei Israel on Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret, and of course, Simchat Torah. We learned how the younger generation seeks the blessings of the elders, how this is a time of matchmaking, that the Etrog, which is a holy fruit, after being used for six days, is donated to young married girls for its mystical powers. We heard that on Hashanah Rabbah, the men study all night (perhaps akin to the Tikkun Leil Shavuot) and no meat is consumed that day. Todah Rabah! We then heard Rabbi/Cantor/President Romiel Daniel give us a very meaningful Rosh Hashanah/Yom Kippur message. Yashay’ir Koach.

We look forward to greet you as our Ushptzim - guests - at our Sisterhood dinner meeting in the Sukkah at 6:30 P.M. on Chol Hamoed, Wednesday, Oct. 3rd. It

will be a most interesting and happy meeting. It is “First Come, First Served” and regretfully, the walls of our Sukkah do not expand. We hope that your reservation was made in time to join us - if not, there’s always next year.

Hold these dates! Friday, November 2nd and Shabbat, November 3rd, our Shabbaton weekend - Shabbat dinner on Friday, kiddush after services on Shabbat, and a Sisterhood tea in the afternoon. On Tuesday, November 13th, our own Mollie Alkana will discuss a new book with us - A Pigeon and a Boy by Meir Shalev. More next month!

Many of us already proudly wear the new Torah pin - Uri Uri - with the Shofar extending from the Ay’jin and the sun joining in to wake us to do our commitments. Let us greet the new dawn together. This project demonstrates our involvement with J.T.S., the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies, and Neve Schecter in Jerusalem and the assurance that our future is provided for. Our book selection for October 17th is The Tiger's Wife by Tea Obreht. This is Tea Obreht's debut novel and it is a flawless synthesis of politics, folklore and tradition. The principal character Natalia is a doctor like her grandfather. Her grandfather's folklore merges into Natalia's life and helps her deal with medical and other situations. The author has lived in the United States since she was twelve years old but she creates a vivid sense of the book's war torn region (we're never told exactly where all this is taking place).

Tea Obreht was born on September 30, 1985 in Belgrade, Yugoslavia where she lived with her mother and maternal grandparents until 1992. She and her mother lived in Egypt and elsewhere and, in 1997, they settled in the United States. After graduating from the University of Southern California, Obreht received an M.F.A. in fiction from the creative writing program at Cornell University in 2009. She currently lives in Ithaca, NY.
