HIGH HOLIDAY TICKETS

Rego Park Jewish Center is preparing for the High Holidays, which will be officiated by Rabbi Romiel Daniel and Guest Cantor Yehudah Hirschfeld.

We will begin selling High Holiday tickets to non-members on Aug. 9th.

FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

The month of Av is the fifth month of the year on the Jewish calendar and shows up right smack dab in the middle of summer sometime during July and August. It's actually quite a contrast.

While most in the Northern hemisphere are enjoying the summer and trying to soak up as much sun as they can before fall hits, the Jewish world enters into the most devastating time of the year. That's because it is during Av, specifically on the 9th day of the month, Judaism commemorates the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. This is the "fast of the fifth month" that is referred to in Zechariah 8:19.

But even before that there are three weeks of mourning and the heightened nine days of mourning that begin on Rosh Chodesh Av. During these nine days traditional Jews refrain from, among other things, listening to music, drinking wine, and even swimming and to some level bathing. It's all meant to decrease one's joy. A large portion of Av is spent lamenting for the sins of the past and petitioning G-d to have mercy in the future. In reality it's not something that people generally look forward to. If I were to be honest, Av is like a black mark right in the middle of a beautiful summer.

But along with the association of the destruction of the Temple, mourning practices, and fasting with the month of Av, there is a strange tradition that the Messiah will be born at this time. Here's the legend as told in the *Midrash Rabbah*:

It happened that a man was ploughing, when one of his oxen lowed. An Arab passed by and asked, "What are you?" He answered, "I am a Jew." He said to him, "Unharness your ox and untie your plough" [as a mark of mourning]. "Why?" he asked. "Because the Temple of the Jews is destroyed." He inquired, "From where do you know this?" He answered, "I know it from the lowing of your ox." While he was conversing with him, the ox lowed again. The Arab said to him, "Harness your ox and tie up your plough, because the deliverer of the Jews is born." "What is his name?" he asked; and he answered, "His name is 'Comforter'." (Lamentations Rabbah 1:51)

In this obscure midrash an Arab not only informs a Jewish man that the Temple has been destroyed during the month of Av but that the Messiah was born during this month as well. Specifically these events are both being associated with the Ninth of Av. But why would the Messiah be born on the Ninth of Av? Rabbi Abun comes along and states that Scripture teaches that the two concepts—"exile" represented by the destruction of the Temple and "redemption" represented by the birth of Messiah—go hand in hand:

Rabbi Abun said: "... there is an explicit text wherein it is stated, 'Lebanon will fall by the Majestic One' (Isaiah 10:34), which is followed by, 'There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse, and a branch from his roots shall bear fruit" (Isaiah 11:1). (*Lamentations Rabbah* 1:51)

In other words, even at the beginning of exile and the destruction of the Temple, G-d promises that one day the Messiah will come and redeem Israel. The story is not so much about predicting when the Messiah will be born but to point out that even in total darkness there is light in the distance.

Returning to words of Zechariah 8:19: "Thus says the LORD of hosts: '... The fast of the fifth ... shall be to the house of Judah seasons of joy and gladness and cheerful feasts."

Although in this present age we mourn in Av and think about the sins of the past that brought the exile to begin with, there is a glimmer of hope that shines in the distance. May it be soon and in our days. Amen.

- 1 Av (circa 1273 BCE) Death of high priest Aaron
- 7 Av (586 BCE) First Temple invaded by King Nebuchadnezzar
- 9 Av (586 BCE and 70 CE) Holy Temples destroyed by the Babylonians and Romans respectively.
- 9 Av (133 CE) Fall of Betar to the Romans, ending Bar Kochba's rebellion.
- 9 Av (1290 CE) Jews are expelled from England by King Edward I and not permitted to legally return for 350 years.

The month of Elul is the 6th month in the Hebrew calendar and the last month of the Jewish yearly cycle, occurring in August or September. The month of Elul precedes the month of Tishrei during which communities celebrate the High Holidays including Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Rosh Chodesh Elul (the beginning of the month of Elul) begins in the evening on Wednesday, August 8, 2021. Leil Selichot (in the Ashkenazi tradition) begins after nightfall on Saturday, August 28, 2021.

As Elul is the last month in the Jewish yearly cycle before Rosh Hashanah (the Jewish new year), it is viewed as a month of reflection on the previous year and looking forward to the next year. With this focus, Elul is regarded as a month of *Teshuva* (forgiveness) or returning to a clean state. In the biblical tradition, on Rosh Chodesh Elul, Moses began his ascension to Mount Sinai for the third time, coming down 40 days later on Yom Kippur with the second set of Tablets and G-d's complete mercy and forgiveness. Because of this, Elul has become the time for *Teshuva* and introspection.

An acronym of Elul is *Ani L'dodi, V'dodi Li* (Song of Songs 6:3) with each starting letter of the words in the Hebrew phrase spelling E-L-U-L. Translated as "I am to my beloved, and my beloved is to me," traditional commentary describes the relationship between Jews and G-d during this month as that between two beloveds, with a yearning to connect. It is said that the King is in the field during Elul; G-d makes Himself approachable to all His people in Elul.

Traditionally there are no Torah obligations or laws regarding Elul and practices for the month of Elul are customs that have been repeated for generations. The shofar is blown each day during weekday morning services from Rosh Chodesh Elul until Erev Rosh Hashanah; an invitation to "wake up" before the High Holidays, this shofar blast is seen by some as an opportunity to awaken our souls and inspire deeper connection with G-d.

During this season, a recitation of *Tehillim* (Psalms) 27 is added to morning and evening prayers. Some have a custom of continuing this addition until Yom Kippur, when it is said that forgiveness is given, while others have a custom of reciting until the seventh day of Sukkot, when the judgement is sealed. Another custom of Elul is reciting *selichot* (prayers for Divine forgiveness). The Sephardic tradition is to recite *Selichot* every day of Elul while the Ashkenazi tradition is to add these prayers starting the Saturday night before Rosh Hashanah.


