FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

<u>ADAR</u>

On the thirteenth day of the twelfth month—that is, the month of *Adar*—when the king's command and decree were to be executed, the very day on which the enemies of the *Yehudim* had expected to get them in their power, the opposite happened, and the *Yehudim* got their enemies in their power. *Esther 9:1*

The Bible does not name the Hebrew months, but declares that the month containing the holiday of Passover, the month we refer to as Nisan, is the first month. The month preceding Nisan is Adar, and therefore, according to the Biblical manner of counting months, it is 12th and final month of the year.

There are seven leap years every 19 years in the Jewish calendar cycle, and during every leap year the month of Adar is doubled: there are two months of Adar, Adar *aleph* and Adar *bet*. In a leap year, the holiday of Purim, celebrated on the 14th of Adar, is celebrated in Adar *bet*.

The month of Adar contains the festive holiday of Purim which falls out on its 14th day. As such, the Talmud (Taanit 29a) instructs to increase in joy the entire month. As Adar precedes Passover, it was, in fact, the last month that the Jews spent enslaved in Egypt, making it a time of joy. We also rejoice over the salvation of the Jews from the decree of the evil Haman at the time of Purim.

This is precisely the opposite of the month of Av in which Jews decrease joy to commemorate the sad events that took place in that month, most notably the destruction of both Temples.

The central theme of the holiday of Purim is turning light into darkness, referred to as *venahafoch hu*, which means things turning upside down or reversing the situation in a surprising way.

And so, on the thirteenth day of the twelfth month—that is, the month of *Adar*—when the king's command and decree were to be executed, the very day on which the enemies of the *Yehudim* had expected to get them in their power, the opposite happened, and the *Yehudim* got their enemies in their power. *Esther 9:1*

This is epitomized by Haman's choice of when to annihilate the Jews, which he accomplished by throwing lots. By chance, the 13th of Adar came up. Haman was thrilled, as the 7th of Adar was the day that Moses died. He assumed that the month was a dark time for the Jews. What Haman didn't know, however, was that the same 7th of Adar was also the day that Moses was born. Thus, the month that Haman thought was a time of darkness was actually a time of great joy for the Jews.

During the Second Temple period, there was a Jewish custom to make a public proclamation on the first day of the lunar month Adar, reminding the people that they are to prepare their annual monetary offering to the Temple treasury, known as the half-shekel.

<u>NISAN</u>

Nisan is the first month of the Jewish calendar and it coincides with the first sign of the astrological calendar – the change from the last sign of Pisces back to the beginning of the wheel to the first sign of Aries. This month is about change and new beginnings. In the Torah, Nisan is referred to as "the month of Spring".

Nisan is also the month of the holiday of Passover, which celebrates the liberation of the Israelites from Egyptian slavery. It is the ultimate freedom from what has held us back and movement into self-mastery by cleaning the slate of these barriers.

This month is a time to remember miracles and the power of pure belief. Some aspects of the Passover story seem almost too fantastical to believe: the plagues that killed the Egyptian firstborn, the unleavened bread that became matzah, the parting of the Red Sea that saved the Israelites and killed their oppressors, and survival in the desert for 40 years. The story of Passover teaches us to believe in miracles, even when we are at the end of our rope, even when we least expect they can occur.

We are at the beginning. The magic of Spring is that it awakens something within us. We feel the first stirrings of new life, and a sudden desire for full expression.

We are moving through huge changes, but they are changes for the better. This month is about revealing ourselves, revealing our truth, coming to the surface in the way that those first crocus flowers of spring pop up suddenly from the cold ground. We are ready to reveal ourselves and to be seen.

The struggle is over, and we take peace in knowing that we have met our challenge head on, and we are starting fresh.

Now is the time to truly let go of the hardships we may have felt and the hard lessons that these last months have given us. The lessons have been integrated, the struggle is released; we look toward the horizon standing on new ground. We can't quite see what is over that next mountaintop, but a part of us knows and believes it can only be good and better.

Stand in the sun and let its bright light wash over you, enjoy that moment of pure bliss where you are feeling where you are, that you have arrived.

Allow yourself to be moved and made whole by this renewed burst of energy that we are experiencing. Sit for a moment, feel yourself, and finally realize that you are whole.

This is only the beginning.



The topic for discussion will be, "The Role of Food as Medicine" - Redefining Health and Wellness.



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CHANUKAH REVISITED

Since we could not include this in the Jan/Feb Bulletin, we wanted to share with you our lovely afternoon on Sunday, December 18th in the Sisterhood Room, beautifully decorated by Robin Basdeo.

Lynne Zakoff and I hosted this event which was attended by 35 persons. After welcoming Rabbi Romiel and Noreen Daniel, I gave a short talk on the history of the Menorah which is the oldest continuously used religious symbol in western civilization and appears as the symbol of Israel on its flag. Based on my talk we had a fun time giving out special goodie bags to those who spun the dreidel and gave the correct answer to a question based on the talk.

The Rabbi spoke about the holiday and why it is important to keep the lights of Chanukah illuminated not only for ourselves but for people of all races and religions. It was really nice seeing everyone enjoying themselves and talking to one another sharing memories of Chanukah. Noreen and others shared how they celebrated Chanukah in countries as diverse as India, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, France and other countries. From song sheets distributed by the Rabbi, we sang Chanukah songs.

Soon it was time for hot latkes which had tempted us with their aroma since they had been delivered. Of course we know that latkes are eaten because they are fried in oil, as oil symbolizes the miracle of the tiny bit of oil which lasted for not one day, but eight.

Thanks to Rabbi Daniel for making it possible to enjoy our repast complete with applesauce and sour cream, shortly followed by delicious Sufganiyot (jelly donuts) Thanks to Lynne Goldwaser for her encouragement and help in ordering and taking reservations which were necessary due to our space restrictions, and to Lynne Zakoff for going to Mezze and ordering latkes.

As the afternoon sky darkened into night, we followed the Rabbi into the chapel where he led us in prayers while Noreen lit the first candle on our beautiful menorah and sang songs from the song sheet.

As good nights and hag sameachs were exchanged, we wanted to get home to enjoy our own menorah lighting, having enjoyed a very beautiful afternoon knowing why our ancestors celebrated the Festival of Lights (so named by the famous Jewish Historian, Josephus Flavius who lived during the first century) and praying that our lives and those of all peoples can be illuminated by the warmth of the flames floating from their little holders on our menorahs. Our faith makes us aware of how the continuity of our holidays help us to remember our history and to recall with pride that our ancestors did the same.

None of this would have been possible without Lynne Zakoff, my co-host who came up with the idea that we must "do something for Chanukah" and Elliott Zakoff for giving us ideas and taking Mom to stores to buy decorations, dreidels and other items. This is our first anniversary without the presence of many of our members and we especially felt the absence of our Sisterhood President, Ruth Loewenstein, who we know would have loved sharing Chanukah with us.
