FROM THE RABBI'S DESK

MARCHESHVAN

Why is the month called Marcheshvan? The Targum translated mar as tipah, a drop, in the verse "Hen goyim k'mar midli - Behold, the nations are as a drop of [water from] a bucket" (Isaiah 40:15). As such, the name means the "rainy Cheshvan," and far from mar meaning bitter, it connotes a month of blessed rain.

Marcheshvan (sometimes called Cheshvan) is the second month of the Jewish calendar counting from Rosh Hashanah (the eighth from Nisan). Cheshvan is the only month that does not have any holidays or special mitzvot. We are taught that it is "reserved" for the time of Moshiach, who will inaugurate the Third Temple in the month of Cheshvan.

We find two events that occurred in the month of Cheshvan. The first was the flood in the times of Noah. The flood began on the 17th of Cheshvan, and the waters receded by the following year on the 27th of Cheshvan, allowing Noah and the other inhabitants of the ark to disembark. Interestingly, one explanation of the name Bul is that it stems from this month as the beginning of the rainy season in Israel; it is thus connected to the word mabul, flood - an overabundance of rain.

The second important event that occurred in Cheshvan seems unrelated at first glance. This was the death of Jacob's wife Rachel, as well as the birth of Benjamin, which occurred on the 11th of Cheshvan.

MARCHESVAN IN HISTORY & TRADITION

- 11 Marcheshvan (circa 2105 BCE) Methuselah dies at age 969
- 11 Marcheshvan (circa 1553 BCE) Death of Rachel while giving birth to Benjamin
- 12 Marcheshvan (1995) Assassination of Yitzhak Rabin; now a national memorial day
- 15 Marcheshvan (165 BCE) Death of Matityahu (Mattathias), who began the Maccabean revolt in the city of Modiin
- 16 Marcheshvan (1938) Kristallnacht/Pogromnacht: 1,400 synagogues and numerous copies of the Tanakh are purposefully and systematically set on fire and allowed to burn in Nazi Germany
- 17 Marcheshvan (circa 960 BCE) First Temple completed by King Solomon (it was not inaugurated until the following Tishrei however)

KISLEV

Kislev is a month which occurs in November - December on the Gregorian calendar and is sometimes known as the month of dreams. Kislev (or Chislev) is the ninth month on the Jewish calendar, counting from Nisan. It is best known for the holiday of Chanukah, which begins on 25 Kislev. The message of Chanukah is the eternal power of light over darkness - good over evil. Aside from commemorating the miraculous victory of the small Jewish army over the mighty Syrian-Greek empire, Chanukah celebrates the miracle of the oil. When the Jews sought to light the Temple menorah after the war, they found only one small jug of pure oil. Miraculously, the one-day supply burned for eight days, and the sages instituted the eight-day festival of Chanukah during which we kindle the menorah nightly.

The sages tell us that the construction of the Mishkan (Tabernacle) was completed during this month. Moses delayed the inauguration, however, until the springtime month of Nisan, the month in which Isaac was born. Kislev was recompensed when, nearly a thousand years later, the Temple was rededicated on Kislev 25 during the Chanukah events.

KISLEV IN HISTORY & TRADITION

- 17 Kislev (1947) the United Nations General Assembly approves a plan for the partition of Palestine, which eventually led to the creation of the State of Israel.
- 25 Kisley (164 BCE) The Chanukah miracle
- 25 Kislev (167 BCE) The Greeks make pagan sacrifices in the Temple.
- 27 Kislev (circa 2105 BCE) Flood rains cease (according to Genesis 6-8)

Thanks again to Martin, Sandy and Jeffrey Novzen, Robin Basdeo & Lynne Goldwaser who coordinated everything.


